To turn on a thousand or more cats, cool or otherwise, requires a thumping good sound and at the JS Splashdown we had three groups with just that. A fourth group entertained one and all at the fair.

## APPLE ROCK CONSPIRACY


Philip—lead guitar; Naval—rhythm; Keith—bass; Irwin—percussion; Dinshaw—organ.

They insist on first names only: exception Dinshaw. Influenced by Led Zeppelin, Jethro Tull and Crimson King. Consider Jimi Page of Led Zeppelin and Ian Anderson of Jethro Tull as the leading artistes in the 'acid' scene today.

They sadly lack equipment—a comparison with well-equipped Bombay groups, but turn in a good wallopping sound. Philip writes and reads music and is considered the best 'acid' lead guitarist in Bombay. dows, Ventures. Started in May 1969 when drummer Britto found the name Busy Bees on a coat-hanger, liked it and decided to form a group with himself, Valen-tine and Bridgenell who had been amusing themselves playing to-gether at each other's houses.

"We had very little equipment,"

said Miranda. "Began hiring it then saving up to buy and now have some Rs. 3,000 invested in high-powered gizmos. Like most Bombay groups, BB take Rs. 350 to Rs. 400 for a night's stand. "Which is till midnight but once we get turned on there's no stop-

Perry-vocalist; Lionel Everett

Everett Perry—vocalist; Lionel Taylor—lead guitar; George Taylor—bass; Nissen Ezekiel—rhythm; Bobby Furtado—drums.
Bearded Godfrey Uttanwalla took over as manager in 1967.
"I've done a lot of things like interior decor (still do private jobs), flower arrangement and pop painting. There isn't enough in beat music (in India) to keep body and soul together. Nobody does it to make a living yet." Elsewhere, a person like Everett Perry would be making a real name for himself, said Godfrey. "He composes all our numbers. Mostly all our stuff on records now is his. He's got hundreds (of compositions). We've only put down four so far."

The Combustibles demand and get Rs. 400 to Rs. 500 an engagement; earn an average of Rs. 3,500 to Rs. 4,000 a month. We have about Rs. 25,000 worth of equipment and are still subscribing to it, so have to get the money back somehow or we've had it. Take just a while back; we were playing on the Dufferin at one of their shows and one of our Vox amplifiers fell into the sea—it was suddenly down there, 3,000 bucks worth. I managed to fish it out with a barge pole, but it was completely ruined.

Plans? "We hope to go to Bahrein. Hope." Spreading out four LPs for my inspection, he said: "This is the sort of thing we do. We love Creedence Clearwater, also Led Zeppelin. And Jethro Tull and the Cream, as you can see."

"Right now the demand is for more (pop music). We hope to keep going as long as it lasts. There's a limit to getting commer-

"RIGH common the demand is for more (pop music). We hope to keep going as long as it lasts. There's a limit to getting commercial—one gets sick of doing the usual thing. Get on to acid the likes and no one knows what's happening—well hardly 25 %. It's bad. I suppose things will get better when TV comes in, but wonder how long that will be."

We've just done an LP with Polydor. Not named yet, I think 'Live Combustibles' or 'Combustibles Live.' One side our own, the other mostly Creedence and Cream. If you're too way out or too acidish you don't make it here, but the crowd is getting educated. Pop sales are pretty good as far as I know."

Ramesh Kar (20)—bass and Naresh Kar (20)—rhythm (they are twins); Trilok Gurtu (19)—drums; Jungoo Gazder (19)—vocalist; Burgess Kharsethu (24)—organist; Farida Vakil (19)—lead guitar and vocalist.

The group was started by Perriz Charda in February 1969—he was the drummer, but got so demoralized by the bad notices he had at the time of the last Simla Beat contest, particularly in JS, that he has quit. The Squad is a very popular Bombay group.
